

Railway Ave near Station entry



1. The Old Goods Shed Built in 1884, the Shed served the growing population of the village, sending produce to Sydney and receiving food and other goods in return.

> It is now the home to the Bundanoon History Group and houses its collection of historical records, images and artefacts.

The Shed is normally open on the first and third Sunday of each month.

2. Bundanoon Emporium Originally a weatherboard 15 Railway Ave



building on a two-acre site, the Calverley family's Bundanoon Emporium later traded as a drapery. In 1968 it became the area's first supermarket, run by Richard and Shirley Tebbutt.

3. The Paragon café 21Railway Ave



Built as a café for Charles Panoretto in 1929, the Paragon Dance Studio opened upstairs the following year.

A general store, from 1958, then Ducky's Diner operated here from 1973, until it became a Chinese restaurant in 1995.

4. The Third Post Office





The postmaster's residence and the third post office closed in 1958 when the present post office was built. It has since been a café / restaurant under various names and a nursery.

31 Railway Avenue



5. The first Police Station 'Altona' was built by the Calverley family in 1905 to serve as Bundanoon's first Police Station. The first stationed police officer was in residence; stables and lock-up out the back. The Calverley family later moved into the building themselves.

6. The Double-fronted shops

33 Railway Avenue



Since around 1927 this has been a hairdressers, a billiard and gaming saloon, bike and golf hire, a magic shop in the 1970s, a general store in the 1980s and other uses since.

7. Willamurra and The French Inn 37-39 Railway Ave



Built in 1906 by Joseph Tooth. Guesthouse, then Jane Brown's late-night coffee shop, Pierre's nightclub, a pottery from 1980.



No 37: Built 1926; accommodation; Bon Ton café; McVicker's restaurant; a steam laundry; an antique shop and a bakery.

8. Ye Olde Bicycle Shoppe

11 Church St



Built early 1900s, this building was variously Bundanoon's second Post Office, a general store and a bicycle hire and repair shop. The mural was added in 2002.

9. Uniting Church 4 Church St



The original Primitive Methodist Church, on the site now occupied by the Hall, was replaced by this building in 1885.

The adjacent cemetery has some of the earliest graves in the village.

10. Holy Trinity Anglican Church

15 Church St



This 1905 stone building replaced the original timber church which opened in 1877 and was destroyed in a bush fire in 1904. A cemetery is at the rear of the church.

11. The Pill Factory 12 Anzac Parade

Built in the 1860s by William Augustus ('Gus")



Nicholas, it was here that he produced his range of Golden Cross homeopathic remedies. The building was later a guest house and a restaurant.

12. Nancy Kingsbury Park Anzac Parade Donated in 1959 by the Kingsbury family in honour of



their daughter. who died at a young age, the park is maintained by the Bundanoon Garden Club.

13. Soldiers' Memorial Hall 3 Railway Avenue

Built in 1934 in the art-deco style of the period by



the local RSL sub-branch. the Hall is still the hub of the village, hosting concerts, films, dinners, meetings and many other events.

14. Bundanoon Railway Station

The station opened on 6 August 1868 as Jordans Crossing, was renamed Jordans Siding in 1878 and



finally Bundanoon in 1881. The buildings were erected around 1910-15.

The station was a bustling place in the guest-house era.
